Women's Effective Leadership Roles during the Covid-19 Pandemic Crisis: Truth or Fable?

ABSTRACT

The purpose of this research is to examine the studies on women's effective leadership roles, with a focus on middle managers, top managers, and government heads. This study is based on an examination of existing literature, specifically on women leaders who were successful in times of crisis and the characteristics that contributed to their success. One such recent crisis is the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, and according to several publications, female leaders all over the world managed to tackle the COVID-19 situation more effectively than their male counterparts.
